6.	When Moses asks Aaron about the golden calf, Aaron gives several excuses or justifications for his sin. List them here. Exodus 32:22-24
	How do we make excuses or justify our sin today?
7.	Exodus 32:25 says many of the people are still "running wild" so God, through Moses, calls for those who are, "for the Lord," to step forward and kill those engaged in evil acts. Although this passage seems harsh, what does it teach us about God's tolerance of sin? Exodus 32:27-29 (Be sure to complete the reflection question if you are struggling with this part of the story.)
8.	Moses knew the sin of the people required atonement (reparation for a wrong or injury). In an incredible act of love and leadership, what did Moses offer to do to make atonement for the sin of the people in Exodus 32:30-32?
9.	Reflect and Connect to NEW TESTAMENT: Although God did not accept Moses' life as an atonement for the sins of the people, He later did accept another man's life. Read 1 John 2:1-2 and reflect on the beautiful truth found there. Record your thoughts. Note: Some translations use the word, "propitiation" which means atonement
