

When I Hunger For Awe

How does worshipping God through trials, troubles, and terrors develop a bigger view of Him? A big view of God results in a big commitment to God. Considering this, how you can increase your view of who God is in your life, so that He can become a bigger presence.

Scripture Text: Psalm 66

Sermon Points: The bigger your view of God, the better your view of everything else.

- God is big enough for everyone (v1-7)
- God is big enough for anything...trials, troubles, or terrors (v8-12)
- God is big enough for me (v13-20)

Weekly Practice: Like Psalm 66, create your own list of great things God has done in your life. Praise Him for each one. You get bonus points if you share your list with someone.

Opener Question: Has God done anything great in your life this week?

Discussion Questions:

- 1. We need to see how big God is in our lives. Fill in the blank, "God, I need you to be big in my _____ right now." In what ways do you need God to be big for you?
- 2. Can our perspective of our worship to God influence our perception of who God is? How? What are some examples of worship outside of singing praise?
- 3. We often relate with God as fair-weather friends. How does worshipping God through trials, troubles, and terrors develop a bigger view of God? How does worship carry us through to abundance?
- 4. A big vision of God results in big commitment to God. In what ways has your commitment to God been too casual? What's one thing you can do to make it more radical?
