MY APPLICATION

Use the following questions this week to reflect on what it would mean to align yourself with the truths taught in Scripture. Each question is meant for both personal reflection and as a catalyst for discussion with your family, friends, or small group.

- 3. Jesus is the Good Shepherd. Read John 10:1-18. From this passage, why is Jesus worth following? How have you experienced the goodness of Jesus as your shepherd?
- 4. Jesus, the Chief Shepherd, appoints elders in the church to lead us as his flock. (See 1 Peter 5:1-4.) Give some examples of how you have followed the leadership of the elders of our church.
