



1. In what areas of your faith are you living out *devotion*, and where has *convenience* crept in?

📖 **Acts 2:42** – “They devoted themselves to the apostles’ teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer.”

- The early church didn’t treat community like a once-a-week event—they built their lives around it. Devotion required effort, but it produced transformation.
- **Follow-up:** What would it look like to take one step from convenience to commitment in your relationship with the church or with others in this group?

2. Where have you experienced real community—not just connection?

📖 **Acts 2:44-45** – “All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need.”

- This was radical care in action. Not surface-level friendliness, but sacrificial love that showed up in practical ways.
- **Follow-up:** Can you share a time you were truly cared for—or had the chance to care for someone else in a way that reflected this kind of love?

3. What do people see when they observe how Christians treat each other?

📖 **Acts 2:46-47** – “They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts... And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.”

- The early church’s authentic love and unity made the gospel attractive. Others wanted to be part of it—not because of flashy events, but because of how they lived.
- **Follow-up:** Who around you might be drawn to Jesus by how your group or community lives out faith? What’s one simple step your group could take to reflect that kind of love outwardly?
